




Ask and you shall receive from your Father in heaven.

Scripture: Matthew 7:7-12

7 "Ask, and it will be given you; seek, and you will find; knock, and it will be opened to you. 8 For every one who asks will receive, and he who seeks finds, and to him who knocks it will be opened. 9 Or what man of you, if his son asks him for bread, will give him a stone? 10 Or if he asks for a fish, will give him a serpent? 11 If you then, who are evil, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will your Father who is in heaven give good things to those

who ask him! 12 So whatever you wish that men would do to you, do so to them; for this is the law and the prophets.

Meditation: Do you expect God to hear your prayers? Esther's prayer on behalf of her people is a model for us. She prayed for help according to God's promise to be faithful to his people. God wants us to remember his



promises and to count on his help when we pray.

Jesus wanted to raise the expectations of his disciples when he taught them how to pray. Jesus' parable of the father feeding his son illustrates the unthinkable! How could a loving father refuse to give his son what is good; or worse, to give him what is harmful? In conclusion Jesus makes a startling claim: How much more will the heavenly Father give to those who ask! Our heavenly Father graciously gives beyond our expectations. Jesus taught his disciples to pray with confidence because the Heavenly Father in his goodness always answers prayers. That is why we can boldly pray: Give us this day our daily bread. Those who know God and trust in God's love, pray with great boldness. Listen to what John Chrysostom (347-407 AD), a gifted preacher and bishop of

Constantinople, had to say about the power of prayer:

"Prayer is an all-efficient panoply [i.e. 'a full suit of armor' or 'splendid array'], a treasure undiminished, a mine never exhausted, a sky unobstructed by clouds, a haven unruffled by storm. It is the root, the fountain, and the mother of a thousand blessings. It exceeds a monarch's power... I speak not of the prayer which is cold and feeble and devoid of zeal. I speak of that which proceeds from a mind outstretched, the child of a contrite spirit, the offspring of a soul converted - this is the prayer which mounts to heaven... The power of prayer has subdued the strength of fire, bridled the rage of lions, silenced anarchy, extinguished wars, appeased the elements, expelled demons, burst the chains of death, enlarged the gates of heaven, relieved diseases, averted frauds, rescued cities from destruction, stayed the sun in its course, and arrested the progress of the thunderbolt. In sum prayer has power to destroy whatever is at enmity with the good."

Prayer flows from the love of God; and the personal love we show to our neighbor is fueled by the love that God has poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit (Romans 5:5). Jesus concludes his discourse on prayer with the reminder that we must treat our neighbor in the same way we wish to be treated by God and by others. We must not just avoid doing harm to our neighbor, we must actively seek his or her welfare. In doing so, we fulfill the scriptural

teaching from the "law and the prophets", namely what God requires of us - loving God with all that we have and are and loving our neighbor as ourselves. The Holy Spirit is ever ready to change our hearts and transform our lives in Jesus' way of love and merciful kindness towards all. Do you thirst for holiness and for the fire of God's love? "Let me love you, my Lord and my God, and see myself as I really am - a pilgrim in this world, a Christian called to respect and love all whose lives I touch, those in authority over me or those under my authority, my friends and my enemies. Help me to conquer anger with gentleness, greed by generosity, apathy by fervor. Help me to forget myself and reach out towards others." (Prayer attributed to Clement XI of Rome, 1721)


The Knights of Columbus have been rebuked by Salon magazine for their opposition to gay marriage. That publication asserts they are losing touch with modern enlightened trends and risk becoming irrelevant. It's easy to see how gay marriage violates the natural law given by God, and therefore can never have Church approval, regardless of modern trends or relevancy. Salon fools no one.

But there is another trap being set for the prolifers and the Knights right now that has a more innocent looking face on it, but is even more dangerous than supporting gay marriage in order to remain 'relevant'. It is the claim the pro-lifers in addition to fighting abortion and its related evils, should also be marching for immigrants' rights, leading the opposition to the death penalty, fighting the war on poverty and a host of other issues. Poverty, we are told, is a "pro-life" cause, and so is "immigration" to cite just two examples. Note it is only the pro-lifers who are targeted here. No other "pro-life" organization is being asked to dissipate its resources in that manner, but is allowed to concentrate exclusively on the cause for which it came into being, as it should be. Why only the pro-lifers? Well the proponents of elective abortion are becoming worried at the successes of the pro-life movement over the past few years. Here, they think, is a way to take some wind out of their sails. Make every cause a "prolife" cause and abortion becomes only one of myriad of issues to work on.

Unfortunately even bishops and other leaders in our Church fall for this ruse. There is a good reason why this "seamless garment" approach as it is often called cannot and will not work. It is as follows. Arguably the most important sentence in all that the Founding Fathers wrote is "All men are created equal". We would say "people" today instead of "men". That is a fundamental and essential principle which has guided this country since its beginning. To see how essential it is one has only to look at countries where a different ethic prevailed - an ethic based on the principle that all people are

not equal, that some have less value or no value, and can be killed off when the powerful want to kill them. Hundreds of millions of innocent people have died or suffered cruelly as a result.

Last week a lady named Mary Williams wrote a defense of elective abortion. She admitted that the creature in the womb is a living human from conception, but it is still OK to kill that creature for any reason the mother might have. It's OK because the unborn's life is not as



important as the mother's life. She stated flatly that the simple truth is that "All life is not equal" The implications are staggering. What the proponents of elective abortion are trying to do is nothing less than fashioning an ethic based on the principle of human inequality, that "all life is not equal", and scrapping the essential principle of the American Experiment that "All men are created equal". Nothing can destroy our society more effectively and surreptitiously than that. No other evil in our nation has the potential to sabotage the American Experiment under our noses without our even knowing it than that.

That is why abortion is an insidious evil in a category by itself. Other evils like mistreatment of immigrants, poverty, discrimination etc. may represent a failure or a tardiness to put the principle of human equality into practice, but none of them represent a conscious attempt to replace that principle with a grossly unjust principle of human inequality.

The pro-life movement is being relatively successful now because its members are dedicated, hard-working and increasingly sophisticated. That dedication comes from the realization that abortion is the great danger to our society that it is, and the sense of need to

hammer home that warning to their fellow citizens. To treat abortion as just one of a host of "pro-life" issues under the mantle of the seamless garment would blind people to its unique threat, and prevent it from receiving the attention and commitment that it deserves.

There are other reasons, some very practical ones - like the fact that some donors who fund some other "pro-life" issues, also fund elective abortion. But the most fundamental reason is

the one I cited above. Brother knights, let us remember Christ's admonition to his disciples "Behold, I am sending you out like sheep in the midst of wolves; be wary *and* wise as serpents, and be innocent (harmless, guileless, and without falsity) as doves" (Matt 10:16).

March 10th at Holy Rosary in Woodland


March 15th at St. Mary

March 24th at Our Lady of Assumption



## Catholic Definitions...

## Lent...

Lent is the 40 day season prior to Easter. It is a penitential time of prayer and fasting. The season begins Ash Wednesday and concludes at the end of Holy Saturday, with the Easter Vigil. In the Roman Catholic Church, the 40 days of this season do not include the six Sundays of Lent. Sundays throughout the year are considered "mini-Easters" – they always celebrate the joy of the Resurrection of Christ. The word "Lent" itself comes from *lencten*, simply referring to the Spring season. However, since the Anglo-Saxon period (9<sup>th</sup> century) it has been a popular term for this penitential season. The Latin name for the season, *quadragesima*, is more significant, as it means "forty days" or "fortieth day."

### A Brief History of Lent

In the first three centuries of Christianity, preparation for the Easter feast usually covered a period of one or two days, perhaps a week at the most. Saint Irenaeus of Lyons (ca AD 140-202) even speaks of a forty-hour preparation for Easter. As of the 5<sup>th</sup> century, some Church Fathers, such as St. Leo, believed the 40 day fast to be an Apostolic tradition. However, according to the Catholic Encyclopedia, most modern scholars reject this view. History shows a variety in

both the duration and fasting guidelines in the first three centuries.

The first official reference to Lent as a period of forty days' preparation occurs in the teachings of the First Council of Nicaea in AD 325, which uses the term *tessarakoste*, meaning "fortieth" in Greek. By the end of the fourth century, a Lenten period of forty days was established and accepted.

#### Lent and Baptism

In its early development Lent quickly became associated with the sacrament of baptism, since Easter was the great baptismal feast. Those who were preparing to be baptized participated in the season of Lent in preparation for the reception of the sacrament of baptism. Eventually, those who were already baptized considered it important to join these candidates preparing for baptism in their preparation for Easter. The customs and practices of Lent, as we know them today, soon took hold.
